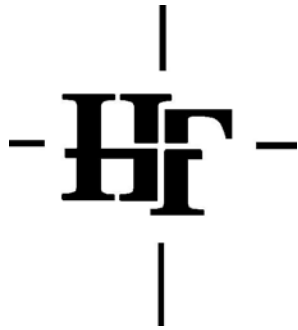

College Applications

Now is the time when applications should be completed!

Although a college may have a January or even later deadline for applications, it is important to realize that an application received earlier will often receive a quicker and sometimes a more favorable response. Colleges are often impressed with the student who demonstrates the initiative to get the paperwork done early. Furthermore, in order to be considered for an academic or merit-based scholarship, some colleges expect a student to have an admission application submitted well before the regular deadline.

Also, seniors must realize that when they turn in applications to us to be processed, they do not get sent out that day. At peak times, it may take us as many as fifteen school days to get the application assembled with the school recommendation, transcript, and school profile and get it sent out. They must consider this fact in their planning. **I continue to tell students that applications should be completed by the end of Thanksgiving Break.**

Online Applications

Almost every day a senior asks, "Should I apply online?" My answer is YES. Colleges prefer it!

The best way to do this is to submit your application online through the college's website. Colleges will often waive the application fee. Follow through by bringing any additional materials that may be requested, i.e. the

school report, application fee, signature page, your essay and resume, etc. to me. Complete a HF Transcript Request Form This will let me know that an application was submitted so that I can send your transcript, test scores, and the school report.

The Common Application is accepted by over 400 colleges. It is a great way to apply to many colleges with only one application. www.commonapp.org

Counselor Contact

Has your senior kept me informed about his/her college plans? I had individual meetings with most of the seniors this fall, but not all of them have followed up that initial meeting. I usually find that lack of contact means lack of action. Encourage your son or daughter to take advantage of the assistance that I can offer, whether that be with filling out applications or deciding which ones to complete. Every student has important decisions to make, and I want to assist them in every way I can. This is true for everyone regardless of GPA, rank, etc.

College Opportunity Fund

As you may be aware, a few years ago our state legislature voted to create a College Opportunity Fund or voucher system for Colorado residents attending public colleges in the state (and some private colleges in the state but for Pell Grant eligible families only).

The state legislature formerly gave money directly to the colleges based on the number of Colorado residents attending each institution. With this pro

gram families are given a voucher certificate, which allows the colleges to receive money from the legislature for each Colorado resident attending public colleges in the state. The money will still travel directly from the legislature to the colleges; each family will simply receive a certificate to forward on to the colleges.

FAFSA and Profile

Completing the FAFSA online ensures rapid processing. You can get a jump-start on the process by registering for a PIN today at www.pin.ed.gov.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be completed by every family who wishes to be considered for need-based financial aid. With college costs as they are, you are strongly encouraged to submit this application. Even some merit-based scholarships and on-campus jobs require that the FAFSA be filed. You are asked to complete the form as soon as possible *after* January 1. Most colleges have a priority deadline for the FAFSA of February 15th. It should be completed online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

In addition, some colleges, particularly private schools, will require that you also complete the *Profile*. This form requests additional information which the FAFSA does not. The *Profile* requires a fee. Registration for the *Profile* can be done online at www.collegeboard.com or by paper using the form available in the College Counseling Center. A list of schools that require the *Profile* is also provided in both places.

Further financial aid information can be found on the Web at www.finaid.org and www.studentaid.ed.gov.

College Rep Visits

College admission representatives are scheduled to continue visiting HFHS through November. Many students find these meetings to be a great opportunity to learn more about colleges as well as make a personal contact. Colleges, on the other hand, value these visits as a recruiting tool.

Campus Visits

Many seniors and juniors have taken advantage of the opportunities which colleges offer for open house programs, campus tours, and overnight stays. We encourage these as a great chance to get

an inside look at the school. Be sure to make arrangements in advance and to complete an Application for Advanced Absence.

ACT & SAT Registration

Any senior who did not take the ACT in October and/or SAT by November is strongly encouraged to do so in December. I recommend that students take both tests at least twice. Registration materials are available online and in the College Counseling Center.

Juniors are also *strongly* encouraged to start making plans to take both the SAT and ACT twice before the end of the school year. I recommend that they wait until second semester. Many highly selective colleges also require the SAT II. I recommend taking these in June and taking them in subjects in which the student is advanced.

Scholarships

Encourage your seniors to keep their eyes and ears open for scholarship opportunities. Each week, a list of scholarships for which we have application information is updated. You can check the list online at www.holyfamilyhs.com under Counseling. Paper copies of the forms are available in the counseling center. In addition, ALL SENIORS should do an online search. The best scholarship search site on the Web is probably www.fastweb.com, but there are many great websites for this purpose.

Juniors

It is never too early to start considering college choices. Some juniors attended the college fairs held at Monarch, Kennedy, Horizon, and Cherry Creek in October. Many juniors have also sat in on the meetings held with the college reps when they visit. Much can be learned about college possibilities which can assist in some initial decision making. Issues such as size, prestige, location, and possible majors can guide some early searching.

The Internet is an especially valuable tool for juniors as they conduct their college search. Specific favorite websites of mine can be found on the HF website under Counseling and in the College Planning Handbook which is available in the main office.

Starting early next semester, I will meet with each junior and his/her parents to map a plan of action. Parents are invited to call and schedule these meetings in January.

College Planning Seminar

All 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students and their parents are expected to attend the College Planning Seminar at Holy Family. This program will occur on January 12th at 6pm. In addition to returning and discussing the results of the PSAT & PLAN, I will provide detailed information about the entire college selection process, including standardized testing, financial aid, and the college search. I am sure that you will find this evening valuable.

Underclassmen

Even though college may seem like a long way off for freshmen and sophomores, much of the groundwork for that decision is being set right now. Good grades, strong curriculum, and serious involvement in activities are important factors in getting into the college of one's choice.

Senior Parent Financial Aid Night

On December 14th at 6pm, a financial aid professional from Regis University will present to senior parents on completing the FAFSA. The FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and is a required form in order to be considered for need based financial aid. FAFSA forms should be completed online and cannot be completed until January. www.fafsa.ed.gov www.studentaid.ed.gov

~ Legal Corner ~

The following is the first of a series of articles dealing with issues affecting teenagers and the law

Teen Driving

Melissa, a sophomore, had a great time at a party following a Friday night football game. The fun came to a halt when police arrived at the party and tested her for alcohol. She received a ticket for MIP (Minor in Possession) after her test showed she had been drinking. She walked home from the party.

Josh was stopped for turning a corner without signaling while driving home from that same party. Although he hadn't had much beer, he was tested and showed a .03 blood alcohol level, below the .05 required for a driving while impaired charge. But because he was only 17, he got a ticket for UDD (underage drunk driving).

Earlier in the evening, Mary broke up with her long-standing boyfriend Matt, a senior. Matt was mad at Mary, so he entered her unlocked car and removed a necklace he had given Mary for her birthday from her glove box. Mary called the police and Matt was charged with illegally entering a motor vehicle.

What do all the above teenagers have in common? Each could lose their driver's licenses if convicted of their criminal charges, even if they weren't driving.

Surprised? Don't be. Under Colorado law, there are a number of factors that can be considered by the DMV (Dept. of Motor Vehicles) when it comes to suspension of a teenagers' driver's license. A license can be suspended for convictions for MIP, DUI (driving under the influence), DWAI (driving while ability impaired), UDD, motor vehicle theft, illegally entering a motor vehicle, a hit and run accident involving injury, failure to pay child support, and committing a felony where a motor vehicle was used. Anyone refusing a blood alcohol test when stopped for DUI, UDD or DWAI will have their driver's license suspended for one year with no possibility of a "red" or probationary license.

The most obvious way to lose a driver's license is to commit too many traffic violations and lose points. Colorado has a "graduated licensing program".

The points increase as the age increases. Colorado law has changed over the years in recognition that young drivers who receive effective instruction when they first start driving are better drivers.

PERMITS

Most teens are eligible to get an instructional permit to drive when they turn 15 years old. The teen must complete a 30 hour state approved instructional class either

in the classroom or online within 6 months of applying for the permit. Once the teen has filled out the proper paperwork, including forms signed by their parents, shows a valid ID and pays the fees, the teen can start driving at 15. If the teen decides to wait until 15 years and 6 months, then the person can choose to complete either the 30 hour course or a 4 hour driver awareness course before the permit will be granted. All permits must be held for one year for any person under age 18. People applying for a permit must pass a written and vision test. After receiving a permit, a six hour behind the wheel driving course must be completed before a driver's license can be obtained. A permit-holder can only drive with a named parent/s or guardian (other additional passengers are also allowed) and must complete a 50 hour log, including 10 hours of night driving.

Anyone caught driving *before* obtaining a permit may be precluded from obtaining a permit for one year from the date of offense. Any points from traffic violations while driving with a permit will carry over onto the person's driver's license when the driver obtains a valid license.

POINTS

Persons between 16 to 18 with a valid driver's license get 6 points in 12 months and 7 points total for the entire time of the license. Translated, that means a conviction for a 6 pt speeding, means a loss of all points, but not the license. However, one additional point will result in a suspension, and two or more points will result in a suspension until the person turns 18.

Persons between 18 to 21 get 9 points in 12 months, 12 points in 24 months and 14 points total. Points are determined from the date of the offense and can be carried over from one license to the next (from a 16-18 driver's license to the 18-21 driver's license). Persons over 21 get 12 points in one year and 18 points in 2 years.

TEEN DRIVING OFFENSES

There are a number of driving offenses that apply only to teen drivers and can result in the loss of points or a driver's license.

Teens under the age of 18 cannot have any unrelated passengers in their car for the first 6 months they hold a driver's license, unless a licensed driver over the age of 21 is also in the car.

During the second 6 months, one unrelated passenger is allowed. Every person riding with a driver under 18 (including the driver) must wear a seatbelt, and there cannot be more passengers in the car than seatbelts. Only one passenger can ride in the front seat. These are all 2 point violations. One carload of kids driven by a person who is 16 years and one month can result in a complete loss of a driver's license if the driver was cited for each offense.

Although any driver in Colorado can be ticketed for texting, or emailing while driving, drivers under 18 are **completely prohibited** from using cell phones for any reason (talking, texting, etc.) while driving, except in an emergency.

All persons under the age of 18 cannot drive between midnight and 5 a.m. unless they have held a driver's license for at least one year. Exceptions include a job during those hours, an emergency, a school sanctioned event with a note from a school official explaining a lack of a bus, etc.

Drinking and driving, as well as driving under the influence of marijuana or other drugs, pose special risks for teen drivers. It is illegal to drink alcohol under the age of 21. Although the minimum blood alcohol (BA) level for DWAI (driving while ability impaired) is .05 under Colorado law, teens under the age

of 21 cannot drive with a blood alcohol level of .02 or above. Doing so will result in a loss of a driver's license for a minimum of 3 months plus a loss of 4 points. If the BA is greater than .049, a teen will be treated the same as an adult, except that it may be much more difficult to obtain a probationary license.

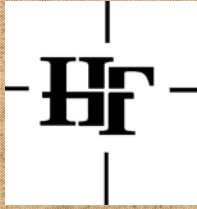
